It's winter again so we need to remember some of the problems associated with city streets and snow removal.

City ordinance # 05-14-2013-2 makes it illegal to park on city streets from November 1st through March 31st. No parking at any time if snow is accumulating on the roadways. Vehicles left in the street are subject to be towed.

It is illegal to push, shovel or blow snow into the street. If you are pushing snow across the street, please take a couple of extra minutes and clean-up any snow that you left on the street. Make sure the street is as wide as it was before you started. (No snowbanks that extend into the roadway.) Those small wind rows that you leave freeze and make it more difficult for your neighbors as they drive down the street and makes it more difficult for the road clean when they start plowing again.

As the workers are pushing snow, they cannot swerve to push the snow to the other side of the street and they can't push right or left to keep from pushing snow into your driveway. They drive straight down the road and push the snow to their right, always.

Be safe and look out for your neighbors if they need your help.

ORDINANCE NO. 05-14-2013-2

AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING WINTER PARKING RESTRICTIONS ALONG ALL CITY STREETS WITHIN THE EUREKA CITY LIMITS.

Be it ordained and enacted by the council of the City of Eureka, State of Utah as follows: SECTION A - DEFININTIONS:

For the purpose of this section, "City Street" shall be defined as being from curb to curb or, being property line to property line.

SECTION B - STATEMENT OF PURPOSE:

It is the purpose of this ordinance to promote the public health, safety, and general welfare of the citizens of this community by preserving our ability to plow the winter snows and keep our roads safe for all to enjoy. **SECTION C - Unlawful to Park, Leave or Abandon:**

It shall be unlawful to park, leave or abandon a vehicle on any portion of a City Street or right of way of a city street beginning November 1 to March 31. No parking at any time if there is any snow accumulation within the travel lanes regardless of date. Vehicles include but are not limited to automobiles, trucks, trailers, mobile homes, travel trailers, boats, buses, ATV's, snowmobiles, or any device used in the transportation of humans, animals, or freight of any kind.

SECTION D - Vehicles Subject to Tow:

Vehicles remaining on City Streets under these conditions are subject to being towed at owners' expense. **SECTION E - Penalty:**

A violation of this Section will be considered a Class C misdemeanor.

This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its passage and posting as provided by law. PASSED AND APPROVED AND MADE EFFECTIVE MAY 14, 2013.
