Dear Resident,

The top priority of our water system is to deliver safe and clean water to your location. We are committed to following all EPA standards and guidance. On December 16, 2021, the EPA released a revised lead and copper rule for culinary water service providers. The revision requires identifying and inventorying service line materials by October 16, 2024, with the aim of protecting communities from lead exposure in drinking water. The EPA has allocated funding to identify potentially hazardous service lines, notify consumers with lead pipes, and provide states with necessary information for oversight and reporting to the EPA.

During the next several months, we will be completing this inventory process throughout our network. Your support is invaluable, and we want to thank you in advance for your cooperation.

WHAT IS A SERVICE LINE?

Your service line includes piping that runs from the water main to your indoor plumbing. In most instances, your service line is free of hazardous materials. However, banned plumbing materials utilized early on in some systems can deteriorate and leach into your plumbing. Firm identification of the material is required to meet new EPA rules.

WHAT CAN I EXPECT DURING THE INVENTORY PROCESS?

We will be using several mechanisms to accurately inventory service line materials outside your home. However, depending on the records we have available for validation, we may need to supplement our investigation with surveys and/or onsite inspections.

County Fair Prep Week July 22nd - July 25th Noon to 2pm







Max A Berry

Max Armond Berry was born on February 3, 1927 to Virgil Armond Berry and Della Maud Argyle. He married the love of his life, Afton Provstgaard, on 22 September 1948 in Payson, Utah. They celebrated their 75th wedding anniversary last September. They solemnized their marriage in the Manti Temple on 21 December 1963.

Max was a devoted member of Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints. He served the church in numerous positions including Sunday School President, Elders Quorum Presidency, Counselor in three different bishoprics, Young Men's Advisor, and many other positions as well as being a devoted Home Teacher.

Max served his country in the US Navy during WWII from Dec 1945-1947. He was honorably discharged on 3 December 1947. Max worked in the mines in and around the Tintic Mining District for 14 years. He then worked for the US Government at Dugway Proving Grounds as an electrician for 30 years. He loved his job and always said he would love to continue to work.

Max left his mark on his beloved hometown of "UR-IKA" (Eureka). He was a skilled carpenter; he repaired and remodeled many homes and businesses in and around Eureka. Because most of the homes were older and anything but plumb, level, and square it took a special skillset to make them habitable and appealing.

Max gave freely of his time and skills serving others asking nothing in return accepting friendship as his reward. Max was the oldest living citizen of Eureka. He was a hard-working, tireless, honest man of his word. He loved his children, but the true love of his life was his devoted loving wife Afton, whom he celebrated more than 75 years of love and companionship with. He never missed a day to tell her he loved her and sealed it with a kiss each night. The other love of his life was his mother; he spent many afternoons before he left for his afternoon work shift visiting and playing cards with her. He had many pets during his lifetime; they too were the recipients of his craftsmanship. He built doghouses that were equipped with heaters to keep them stay warm during the winter. Max was an avid outdoorsman; he was especially passionate about hunting and fishing – passing his love of the great outdoors to his children and grandchildren.

He is survived by his wife, Afton Provstgaard Berry, Eureka; his children, Max Wayne Berry (Marcella) Las Vegas, Nevada, Kathleen Susan Guest (David) Payson, Utah, Scott Armond Berry (Kathryn) Bancroft, Idaho; 15 Grandchildren: Albert Max Berry, Tracy Berry, Tammie Raso, Greg Raso, Christina Berry, Wayne Guest, Matthew Guest, Jonathon Guest, Nathan Guest, Tyler Max Guest, Mandi Berry, Lana Berry, and Kaela Uhrig; 29 great-grandchildren and 20 great-great-grandchildren; his sister Olive Valene Woolridge, Prescott Valley, Arizona. Sandy grew up in Eureka and graduated from Tintic High School. After graduation she followed her dream to become a nurse, attending Holy Cross Hospital Nursing School in Salt Lake City and became a Registered Nurse. Following nursing school Sandy joined the United States Navy Nurses Corps and attended to sailors returning home from the Vietnam War. After leaving active duty, she returned to Eureka finding and marrying the love of her life Jay W. Evans on August 14, 1971.

Sandy was a lifelong member and leader of the Eureka United Methodist Church serving numerous roles from Sunday School teacher, treasurer, and as a Lay Leader when needed. She also was very crafty making hundreds if not thousands of teddy bears and other stuffed animals for newborn babies, sick children, and even adults who sometime need to have a teddy bear to hug. Her baked goods included bread, rolls, pies, and cookies which were renown in Eureka and were always sure to bring a smile to someone's face.

Sandy is survived by her devoted husband Jay Evans, her two sons Greg (and Paula) Evans of Eureka; and Allen (and Inthuorn) Evans of Lexington, South Carolina, her four grandsons Zane (and Brooklyn) Evans of Payson, Utah; Curtis (and Kiona) of Draper, Utah; and Aydin and Raffee Evans of Lexington, South Carolina, two great grandchildren Nora and Owen Evans (and another on the way).
